

Navigating Swinburne



Know your University



Swinburne University of Technology was founded in 1908 as the Eastern Suburbs Technical College in Hawthorn, Melbourne, Australia.

It was established by the Honourable George and Ethel Swinburne, who were committed to providing further education to residents of Melbourne's eastern suburbs. George Swinburne was a successful engineer and businessman, and he recognised the contribution that technical education could make to a flourishing nation.

The college's first classes were offered in 1909 in areas such as carpentry, plumbing, and blacksmithing. By 1911, classes were also available in domestic economy and housewifery. The college grew rapidly in the early years, and by 1913, it had over 1,000 students enrolled.

In 1913, the college was taken over by the State Government and renamed Swinburne Technical College. It continued to grow and expand throughout the 20th century, offering a wider range of courses and qualifications. In 1963, Swinburne introduced its highly regarded Industry-Based Learning program, which combines academic study and industrial experience.

In response to Federal Government reforms in the 1980s, Swinburne became an intersectoral university of technology, providing TAFE education and higher learning. It gained university status on 1 July 1992.

Today, Swinburne is a leading Australian university with over 70,000 students enrolled on campus and online. It offers a wide range of undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in areas such as business, engineering, design,

health, and arts and humanities. Swinburne is also known for its strong industry links and its commitment to providing students with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in the workforce.

Swinburne is particularly well known for its programs in engineering, design, and business. The university's engineering programs are ranked among the best in Australia, and its graduates are in high demand from employers. Swinburne's highly regarded design programs have produced some of Australia's most successful designers, and the university offers a variety of well-ranked business programs to suit the needs of students interested in different areas of business.

In addition to its strong academic reputation, Swinburne is also known for its commitment to student support and its vibrant campus life. The university offers a wide range of student services, including academic support, career counselling, and financial assistance. Swinburne's student clubs and societies also provide students with opportunities to get involved in extracurricular activities and meet new people.

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Where are we?

Swinburne University of Technology has three campuses in Melbourne, Australia.

The Hawthorn campus is located in the Melbourne suburb of Hawthorn and is 7.5 kilometres from Melbourne's Central Business District (CBD). This campus is notable for hosting a diverse range of vocational, undergraduate, and postgraduate programs, catering to a wide variety of academic interests and career aspirations.

In 2011, the Hawthorn campus saw the opening of the Advanced Technologies Centre, a 22,000 square metre facility known for its modern architectural design and innovation focus.

Swinburne's law school was launched in 2015. Through a partnership with the Leo Cussen Centre for Law, it became the only law school in Victoria accredited to allow students to complete practical legal training during their final year of study, accelerating their admission to legal practice.

Swinburne is known for its strong emphasis on engineering and has the distinction of being the only academic institution in Melbourne that offers pilot training as part of its aviation degrees. The university also has a cross-departmental innovation studio to foster the development and marketing of new ventures.

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The Croydon campus is home to many of our vocational education courses, VCE (Vocational Major) and VET in Secondary School students, as well as English classes for recently-arrived migrants and refugees. It's home to the \$10 million Flexible Green Trades Complex, the Swinburne Skills and Jobs Centre, and a full range of student services—medical, housing, financial, personal counselling, AccessAbility, childcare and more.

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The Wantirna campus is located in the heart of Melbourne's eastern suburbs, conveniently across the road from Knox City Shopping Centre. Specialist facilities on campus include the early childhood education and nursing simulated training labs, which include two 10-bed nursing wards. It also houses the \$10 million Knox Innovation, Opportunity and Sustainability Centre (KIOSC) to train secondary school students and link them with industry, government and community. At Gallery 369, students from graphic design, visual arts and visual merchandising courses have the opportunity to display their best work. For trades students, there are industry-standard workshops for the building, bricklaying, carpentry, electrotechnology and plumbing trades.

Before you start

Before you start to explore further in your exciting journey, there are three learning modules you must complete, preferably before Orientation and no later than the end of your first semester. These items are located on Canvas, which you will find as you read further into this guidebook:

1. Consent Matters Module

(Compulsory for all students)

Swinburne is committed to preventing all forms of violence, harm and disrespect towards students and staff. This module explains our zero tolerance approach and focuses on respectful relationships, gender equality, healthy masculinity and LGBTQIA+inclusion. This module will help you understand what consent is, how to ask for it and identifying situations in which consent can't be given.

2. Academic Integrity Module

[Compulsory for all students]

Academic integrity means using ideas, knowledge and information to develop your own insights, not presenting someone else's work as your own or trying to gain unfair advantage. It also means acknowledging the work of others when you include it in your work. This module must be completed, as this helps you navigate the expectations and requirements when it comes to your work and submissions in the university and beyond.

3. Pre-Orientation Hub

Get the skills, tips and tricks you need to make the most of Orientation and starting university. These learning modules are created by your fellow students, detailing all the things they wished someone had told them. For the best outcome, complete this before Orientation.



Getting around

Find your way: Navigating around Swinburne can be tricky at first, but don't worry – we've got your back! Every campus has a StudentHQ. Always head here first.

Let's start with maps

The campus map is your trusty sidekick. Get it from the Swinburne app or the university website. It's also printed at the back of this guidebook.

Keep an eye out for signage on campus. They're like little guides telling you where to find that lecture hall or the coffee havens scattered around campus.

Landmark love

Spotting landmarks is like finding treasure. On the Hawthorn campus, look out for the ATC (Advanced Technology Centre) and GS (George Swinburne) building. At Croydon and Wantirna, the best way to get oriented is to find the internal courtyard. All buildings at our Croydon and Wantirna campuses are centred around the courtyard.

Check online for more information

Swinburne language

As with any new place, there will be a bit of terminology to learn. Don't worry, you'll get the hang of it, and it will all become second nature very quickly. To help you navigate the first few weeks, here are some new terms that you'll find useful, along with explanations.

StudentHQ

Your one-stop shop and first point of contact for anything you need. Chat to someone online, over the phone or in person on campus.No request is too small or too large. The team at StudentHQ can solve your problem or help you navigate to the right place to get it solved.

Schools, departments and disciplines

Our teaching and learning areas are made up of six schools (in higher education), three departments (in vocational education) and Swinburne College. You can see a breakdown of our schools and departments later in this guide.

Course

A course is a structured combination of approved units which when completed qualifies a student for a degree.

Unit

A unit is a component of a course that covers one subject area in detail. Think of a unit as being similar to a subject.



Credit Points

Each unit that you study has an agreed value – or credit points. These credit points contribute to the total credit point requirement for a course.

Class

A class is a particular instance of a unit. For example, a first-year nursing unit may have 300 students, and they can't all be in the same classroom. So, the 300 students may be divided into 10 classes of 30. This enables them to be at different times during the week, giving you more flexibility to manage your timetable.

Unit guide

A summary of assessments, requirements and information about a particular unit of study. A guide can be found for each unit via the Swinburne website.

Core units / elective units

Courses are made up of core units and elective units. Core units are compulsory units that you have to study. Elective units are the ones where you get to choose what you want to learn. Core and elective units are specified in the course outline.

Lectures

Lectures are large classes held in massive theatre-style rooms. An educator will provide information through a range of methods that will give you the knowledge you need and set the scene of the activities for the week.

Tutorials / seminars

Tutorial (tutes) and seminars are smaller, conversation-based sessions that enable you to explore a topic in more depth and ask questions of your peers and your educators.

Practicals

Practicals (pracs) are supervised hands-on sessions in a lab or a workshop that enable you to complete activities based on what you have learned in the lecture, tute or seminar.

Academic calendar

This is a yearly calendar that includes all key dates for the university. You can find it here:

Census date

Census date is the last day to withdraw from a unit without having to pay fees. This is the deadline by which students must finalise their course enrollments for a semester. Changes to course registration, including adding or dropping courses, must be completed by this date. It's also when the university finalises tuition fee liabilities and records student enrollments for that period. Check for the census date that is applicable to you:

Admission and enrolment

These are two different things.

Admission is being offered a place in a course. If you are reading this handbook, you are probably already past this point.

Enrolment is the process of selecting the units you will study in the coming year and the actual classes you will attend. You need to complete the enrolment process before classes start. You can do this on My Swinburne, which you can access via the Swinburne mobile app or website. As always, StudentHQ can give you any support you might need.

Major / Minor

A major is a series of eight or more units in an area of specialisation within a bachelor degree course. A minor is a series of four units in an area of sub-specialisation within a bachelor degree course.

Contact hours

Contact hours refer to the number of hours you'll spend in class, lectures, tutes or seminars. Higher education and vocational courses work a little differently. In vocational education, you may have longer contact hours (the number of hours you are expected to attend class), but most of your studies may be completed in class. In higher education, you might have fewer contact hours, but you're also expected to undertake study in your own time. Think of this like homework. The time you spend studying outside of class may vary from week to week. It's important to note that you will not be successful in your studies if you do not commit time in and outside of class to study.

Canvas

Every unit you study will have a home in Canvas, the online learning management system (LMS). This is where you can see everything you need to do, communicate with your educators and fellow students, access readings, information, due dates, and where you submit assignments.

Leave of Absence

Local students are usually permitted to take up to 12 months off (in total) over the duration of their degree. International students can only take leaves of absence under specific circumstances, and usually only after they've completed at least one semester of study. International students should contact the International Student Advisor for options.

Deferment

Students can also take time off at the beginning of their course when they accept their offer. This is to defer their start date for their course.

Withdrawal

This is when a student wants to stop attending a course/unit before they've completed it. StudentHQ will be able to provide advice. International students should first meet with an International Student Advisor if they are thinking about withdrawing from their course.

"Feeling a bit lost? No worries! StudentHQ is there to help you out, offering support for pretty much anything you need. Remember, Swinburne lingo is like its own language, but you'll pick it up in no time. Any questions, just shout. We've all been there!"

Key dates

Here's the lowdown on the important dates you'll want to keep tabs on during your time at Swinburne. Think of this as your friendly guide through the Swinburne calendar maze and it may change based on your studies.

For Higher Education, Swinburne College (SC) Foundation, UniLink Diploma and Postgraduate Qualifying Program (PQP) students, the dates you may want to note are as follows and remember to correspond to your class enrolment (It could be Summer/ Winter Term, HE Block 1-8, Teaching Period 1-3):

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Things to note after you familiarise with your checklist

Fees

What you have to pay: This refers to your tuition fees. You can view your fees at My Swinburne (on your Swinburne app or the website). Depending on your course, you may have extra fees related to it. If you have a sponsor paying for your fees, make sure you have your financial guarantee requirements sorted. And remember, if your sponsor doesn't cover everything, you'll need to pay for the remainder.

Paying your fees: If you have an Australian bank account, you can pay online through Swinburne's portal, BPay, or Post Billpay. You can also make payment on campus, but only with a credit card. If you're paying from your home country, you can make an online or telegraphic transfer.

When to pay: If you're a new student, you need to pay a deposit when you accept your offer.

If you're a continuing student, make sure to pay by the due date on your Statement of Account. Late payment may incur a fine. For international students, late payment can also impact your visa. You may ask for an extension, but typically, you must make payment by your census date.

Financial assistance

Local students may be able to access Commonwealth Supported Places (CSPs), and FEE-HELP or HECS-HELP loans.

Student Services and Amenities Fees

The Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) is a fee that helps pay for services and facilities that are dedicated to you.

What it's for: Health services, sports, events, and even legal advice—all the things that enhance your study experience or help you manage your life and wellbeing.

How much you pay: It depends on how many courses you're taking and whether you're studying full-time or part-time. It may be deferred for some students.

Who doesn't pay: Some students don't have to pay this, like those in some vocational courses or certain international students.

When to pay: You have to pay this fee by the census date for each study period you're enrolled in.

What they can't spend it on: The university cannot use this money to pay for academic services or anything political unless listed in the acceptable provisions.

So, that's the idea with the SSAF. It's there to help fund services that make student life a bit more enjoyable and less stressful. Most importantly, it's for you.

Student Charter

A student charter is essentially a formal agreement between students and the university. It outlines the mutual expectations, rights, and responsibilities. It details the support, resources, and learning environment that they university must provide. It also highlights students' roles in engaging with their studies, respecting university policies, and maintaining academic integrity. It is a bit like a guideline, ensuring everyone understands their part in creating a positive and productive academic community.

Personal support services



Getting support at Swinburne

AccessAbility Services

Disability and carer support

Swinburne is an inclusive and welcoming environment for people living with a disability, medical or mental health condition, or with primary carer responsibilities. If you live with a disability, a medical and/or mental health condition, or you are a primary carer of a person with a disability, you can register for AccessAbility services. To register:

- · Check to see if you are eligible.
- Complete the AccessAbility Registration Form with a health professional.
- · Register with AccessAbility services.

AccessAbility advisers will help you get the most out of your studies.

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Equitable Assessment Adjustments (EAAs)

are adjustments or alterations to the standard conditions or format of an assessment. They can apply to any formal assessment task or exam in the unit of study outline and are available to eligible students living with a disability, a medical and/or mental health condition, or carer responsibilities. EAAs are not a reduction in the academic standard being assessed. You must still meet all requirements of the course and unit.

Swinburne's AccessAbility librarians can assist with accessing library services,

resources, and facilities such as:

- · Retrieving items from shelves
- Organising extended loan periods or computer-access time
- Photocopying
- Searching library information resources
- Booking rooms
- Booking assistive equipment, including voice recorders and smart pens

will help you make tailored use of the career resources that suit you, including online materials, consultations, internship opportunities, workshops, seminars, catered lunches and Swinburne's GradWISE program.

International student advisory and support services

International Student Advisers (ISAs) are here to help with all aspects of living in Melbourne, especially when life becomes complicated. They will also refer you to other services when you need specialist or personal advice. The ISA team works closely with Victoria Police, Fire Rescue Victoria and Surf Life Saving Victoria to ensure international students understand how to stay safe while living in Melbourne.

You can ask an ISA if you want to discuss anything you read or are told about your rights and responsibilities while you are living in Melbourne. If you feel uncomfortable about reporting a crime to police, you can ask an ISA to accompany you to make your report. The International Student After-Hours Assistance Line is available 24 hours when The university is closed for all urgent and emergency matters: (+613) 9214 6741.

Living costs, banking and money

Melbourne is a relatively expensive city, but there are ways to manage your money to make it go further.

Paying your fees

Learn how to pay your fees, when to pay your fees, and what help is available to you as an international student. The ISAs would be able to guide international students who are not Australian or New Zealand citizens or permanent residents and are studying in Australia. It covers tuition fees, which vary depending on the course, and other miscellaneous fees. Sponsored students need to submit a Financial Guarantee. Fees can be checked and paid through "My Finances" on

the Swinburne portal, with various payment methods available. New students must pay a deposit upon accepting an offer, while continuing students have set due dates.

Late payments can result in serious penalties. Online payments provide instant receipts, while for others, receipts are issued upon payment. Remember, your enrolment date into units does not impact the due date for fees to be paid. Try to enrol for the full year, but you will only be charged and have to pay at the due dates.

Student visas

In most cases, if you are an international student reading this, you will already have your student visa to study in Australia. If you want or need to make changes to your study, chat to an ISA as soon as possible to discuss your options. Changes to your study can impact your visa status.

Security

Safer Community

Safer Community offers advice, support, intervention and risk management for those that have been affected by inappropriate, concerning and/or threatening behaviours. This includes behaviour that makes you feel threatened or unsafe, or causes you concern for someone harming themselves or someone else. Examples include bullying, stalking, threats, violence, discrimination, harassment, sexual assault and sexual harassment.

Note: Safer Community is a separate service from Security. Completing the compulsory "Consent Matters" module is a key part of understanding your responsibilities to help deliver a safer community.

Fostering respectful relationships: Consent Matters

Sexual consent is a fundamental aspect of respectful relationships. To ensure a shared understanding of this topic, you are to complete an interactive 40-min online course called "Consent Matters". This course consists of three self-paced online learning modules and seeks to provide an introduction into sexual consent, sexually harmful behaviours, and support and report pathways. There are quizzes at the end of each module to assess knowledge as well as obtain feedback for course evaluation and improvement.

Bullying




Melbourne laneways are where the real magic happens. You'll find street art, quirky shops and cute cafés are hidden here.

Accommodation

Settling in and looking for a place to live

When it comes to finding a place to stay, it always helps to start with student accommodation to allow you some time to familiarise with living in Australia and discovering which area suits you and your budget. The rule of thumb is that the distance from the city determines the affordability of rental. Let's use the Metro map as an indication of the distance and convenience to the city. For the most up to date train and tram map, visit www.ptv.vic.gov.au/more/maps/ Staying close to campus is really helpful if you're planning on being active in campus life. Apart from Hawthorn, consider living along the Alamein, Lilydale or Belgrave train lines. You may be able to find cheaper rental options a little further away from campus. Just remember to compare your potential savings on rent with the cost of public transportation and the time you'll take commuting.

You may start by looking for rental properties via realestate.com.au or domain.com.au to share a house or look for a room, try flatmates.com.au.







Start with the stations nearest to Glenferrie (where Swinburne is located), then look further out until you find something suitable. Don't forget to include the cost of bills and utilities – this could include electricity, gas, water and hot water (if the rental is an apartment).

Where to shop

Woolworths or Coles supermarket:

Large chain supermarkets that offer a wide range of grocery items, fresh produce and household goods.

Local independent grocers: Smaller, independently owned grocery stores that may focus on providing fresh, local produce and unique food items such as Leaf and IGA on Glenferrie Road. There are also independent grocers around our Croydon and Wantirna campuses.

Specialty food stores: These could include stores offering organic products, gourmet foods or international ingredients. For example, a store specialising in Italian products located in the Glenferrie Centre, or the Asian grocers on Glenferrie Road.

Fresh produce markets: Depending on the day or the season, there might be outdoor markets or stalls offering fresh fruits, vegetables and local produce. Examples include Queen Victoria Market, Prahran Market, South Melbourne Market and Preston Market.

Bakeries: Artisanal bakeries along Glenferrie Road may entice you with the smell of freshly baked bread, pastries and sweets such as Via Porta, Baker's Delight, Laurent and Le Vain.

Cafés with deli sections: Some cafés may have deli sections where you can pick up fresh cheeses, cured meats and other deli items along with your coffee. The choices are unlimited. Take a stroll and discover your options.

Chemist/pharmacy: There are two on Glenferrie Road. They are TerryWhite Chemmart and Chemist Warehouse. Remember to bring your script from your doctor to get your prescription filled. For those in Croydon and Wantirna, you can find chemists and pharmacies near you too.



Where to eat

Explore the food scene close to campusthere are many amazing eateries nearby. You can find cozy cafés perfect for a coffee break between classes, as well as restaurants offering everything from quick bites to casual dining experiences. Whether you're looking for something that reminds you of home, a cuisine you've never tried or local Aussie specials, there's something for everyone.

On Hawthorn campus, there's the Atrium Café right at StudentHQ, TD Café in the TD Building, and Café Gomez and UDLE in the SPS Building, opposite the new Indigenous Learning Circle, Wakefield Gardens. The Hawthorn Hotel, across the road from the AMDC Building also has a great chicken parma!

At Croydon and Wantirna campuses, look out for Social Engine Kitchen for your coffee and food needs.

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
