Available to Undergraduate and Postgraduate Business Students

This two week study tour will take <u>business</u> students to the Kimberley (north, Western Australia) to meet and work with local Aboriginal people to develop their budding business ideas into practical business plans. During this time, students will be taken to numerous cultural heritage sites, and speak with communities and Elders where they will learn about ancient Aboriginal culture, and how it is still practiced today.

This study tour is equivalent to one unit, and can be used to <u>replace the second capstone unit</u> in undergraduate business degrees, or taken as an elective in undergraduate or postgraduate business degrees.

Students will visit the cultural heritage sites of Geike Gorge, Tunnel Creek, Mimbi Caves and Windjana Gorge where they will be guided by local tour operators who will share the cultural history and significance of each site.

Students will attend two workshops prior to departure to prepare them for the trip, and one workshop upon their return. While away, students will also experience cultural sensitivity training by locals.

Details

When: Leave Melbourne Sunday 12th July, 2015; fly to Broome, then drive to Fitzroy Crossing. Return to Broome on Friday 24th July and fly back to Melbourne on Sunday 26th July.

Cost: This trip is **partially subsidised** by a local Aboriginal Corporation, so costs to students have been kept to a minimum:
